FROM THE VICAR

Now you are the body of Christ, and each one of you is a part of it. I Corinthians 12:27

The apostle Paul reminded the church in Corinth of their belonging as the body of Christ. Saint Anthony, one of the Desert Fathers said 'Our life and our death is with our neighbour'. And John Donne wrote 'No man is an island entire of itself'.

In recent months we have become increasingly aware of our interconnectedness. At times that has had negative connotations because of the risk of infection heightened by proximity; we have kept our distance lest we inadvertently infect or are infected with an unseen virus.

Yet the distancing and isolation has in itself been damaging and debilitating too. Many have struggled being alone and unable to connect in the usual ways. As humans we are created to flourish with others; community is God's idea—it is not good for people to be alone—it is in relationship that we find fulfilment, meaning and purpose.

Therefore it is not surprising that Jesus' movement for change in the world is his church, a body of people who are diverse and need one another; individuals with difference gifts and abilities who working together demonstrate that the sum is greater than the parts. The body exists that the work of God may continue; what a privilege to be part of that family business!

Therefore in the life of any church we are always looking for ways in which we can help one another to get involved and serve each other and the wider community. The Father has work for us to do. The only way in which we can faithfully act as the body of Christ and be fruitful in mission is alongside one another with each member playing their part.

I warm to the image of an orchestra even though music is not one of my strengths. I am confident that Birmingham Symphony Orchestra notices when the violin section is missing, or one of the cellists decides not to play, or the percussionist dozes off!

Our part in the church may not be a leading one but it makes a difference and without it we are lacking. None of that is to say that those who have been and are still shielding should be rushing back to the church building before they are ready. It is really to say to us all that I think we have missed one another in recent months and that even if it is online or by phone, email or letter, we still have a part to play in the body of Christ, there is still work to be done. **KB**

Jonah 3: 10—4:end, Phil 1:21-end, Matthew 20:1-16 COLLECT:


Lord God, defend your Church from all false teaching and give to your people knowledge of your truth, that we may enjoy eternal life in Jesus Christ our Lord.

Prayer ideas for September

- Set aside a time each day to read a psalm and find the sentences within it that resonate for you and that you can use to pray.
- Spend some time listening. Find a quiet place and time to be attentive to God without distractions.
- Start the day with prayers of gratitude for who God is and all that he has done.
- Think about a charity that is important to you. Talk to God about different aspects of the work of that charity.
- Use your hand as a model, with each finger bringing to mind different people to pray for: Thumb—people who strengthen support and encourage you; Index finger—people who guide and teach you; Middle finger—people who lead and govern; Ring finger—those who are in need—the weak, poor, helpless, hungry, sick and bereaved; Little finger—yourself!

SUNDAY SERVICES

Both churches will continue to have a service on Sunday morning at 10m using September. We will aim for these to be alternate services of Holy Communion and Morning Worship.



Numbers are restricted in order that we can maintain social distancing. At St James' services are usually limited to 18 and at St Nicolas it is now in the region of 40 people. It is helpful if those running a service can have an indication of numbers before the day lest we need to turn people away due to reaching capacity. When you do arrive for a service you will be asked to read and comply with some important safety guidelines. You will be asked to leave your contact details for *Track and Trace*, wear a mask during the time you are in the building and sanitise your hands.

The live streaming of Sunday services will continue.

At the February meeting of General Synod of the Church of England, new targets were set for all parts of the church to work to become carbon 'net zero' by 2030.


The Church of England has also announced an energy footprinting tool (available online) for parishes to calculate their carbon footprint.


The Bishop of Salisbury, Nick Holtam, the Church of England's lead bishop on Environmental Affairs said: "To reach Synod's target of 2030 will not be easy, and requires each of us to hear this as an urgent call to action. But this is a clear statement of intent across the Church and to wider society about our determination to safeguard God's creation. This is a social justice issue, which affects the world's poorest soonest and most severely, and if the Church is to hold others to account, we have to get our own house in order."

In these two sessions we'll be hearing more about this target and what measures we can take to play our part.
