ECO TIPS Tips for gardening and growing:



- Start a compost heap.
- Support local nurseries, rather than big garden centre chains.
- Find out if there is a local seed swap near you and join in!
- Buy organic seeds.
- Don't use garden products that contain peat.
- Don't use chemicals in your gardening.
- Create a garden that's a bit messy! Leave some less tidy places for wild life.
- Install a bat box. Find out more about caring for bats in your church and home by downloading A Rocha UK's special leaflet.
- Put up nesting boxes for birds.
- Introduce plants that attract butterflies and bees, such as lavender, buddleia, and nettles (in a container in the ground to stop them spreading).
- Ensure a regular supply of fresh water and food for birds.
- Don't de-head flowers too quickly. Leave the seeds on for the birds to eat.
- Build a pond being careful with small children, of course. Ensure it has sloping sides so amphibians can get in and out easily, and birds and small animals can drink from it without the danger of falling in. If you can't build a pond, put an old washing-up bowl in your backyard for frogs to enjoy.
- Plant a hedge from native plants such as hawthorn, which will provide both food and shelter.
