

St Nics families are still enjoying Messy Church this year we have run three Messy Church



NEWS FROM THE PCCs

St Nicolas

St Nicolas PCC continues to meet roughly once a month, either in full committee, or as the Standing Committee, in order to take care of the practical aspects of church life, and the conduct of the services. Normally the vicar would be part of the PCC, and has the final say on any decisions, but in the absence of a vicar we have a lay vice-chair in Carole Harris, as well as the Wardens Nick and Garry, and instructions from the Archdeacon not to make any major changes.

Inevitably many of our discussions are about COVID, and what we are and are not allowed to do. There is no particular limit to the number of people we can have at a service so long as faces are covered, and we keep our distance, and we disperse promptly at the end! We have agreed that we can accommodate around 50, and this has now been extended to funerals and weddings as well. Finance is also on the agenda every meeting. We receive no state funding, so all of the finance for running the building, and our contribution to the Diocese has to come from what people give. This is currently less than normal because fewer people are attending services, but also users of the hall are only just beginning to return, so we have had no income from there either. The wardens take care of repairs and routine maintenance, and have arranged for the bulging church floor to be fixed, and the alarm system to be serviced and repaired. More specialist repairs to stone work are required and Nick and Garry will soon be seeking quotes from approved builders to carry out the urgent work highlighted in the Quinquennial Inspection, and to apply for any grants to offset the cost. Meanwhile Dean is pushing forward the Eco Church agenda....bees?

Finally, as a memento of these challenging times the school bought each child a special St Nicolas Keepsake bear to keep and treasure.



TOILET TWINNING



You will see from the photo that St Nicolas has twinned a toilet with a Latrine in Chamiwawa, Katete, Eastern Province, Zambia.

So what is toilet twinning?

By donating £60 to twin our toilet, we have helped fund a project in a poor community that will enable families to build a basic toilet, have access to clean water and learn about hygiene – a vital combination that saves lives.

Your PCC members watched a video where villagers learnt the link between hygiene and disease and built their own toilets. As a result, the incidence of disease reduced dramatically.

The way we travel:

- 1. look for opportunities to car-share (including to church), obviously safely and consider Covid 19 safety precautions
