## Remembrance-tide

November is the season for remembering. Beginning with All Saints Day on the 1<sup>st</sup> of the month, we start by celebrating the huge number of faithful followers of Jesus who have gone before us. Some have been identified as 'Saints' by the Church, but all are saints if they have been made pure and holy by accepting Jesus as their Saviour and Lord. I like the way the writer of the letter to the Hebrews imagines all these saints cheering us along as we run the race of life as Jesus' disciples:

*'Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles. And let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us, fixing our eyes on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of faith.'* Hebrews chapter 12 verses 1-2a.

Be encouraged by saints of all shapes and sizes, and keep going in the race of faith!

This is also one of the seasons when churches hold Family Memorial Services to provide an opportunity to remember the special people in our lives who are no longer with us, and to give thanks to God for them, and to seek God's comfort together in our on-going sense of loss. St James is holding a service on 7 November this year (see details below) and St Nicolas plans a similar service in late Spring.

Remembering is helped by symbols, and the wearing of poppies signals Remembrance Sunday will be with us on 14 November when both churches will hold services at 10 am that will include an act of giving thanks for the service and

sacrifice of those who died to secure freedom and peace. The poppy is a symbol of hope on Remembrance Sunday because we not only look backwards to remember, but we pledge ourselves again to pursue peace, as illustrated by the simplicity and beauty of a field of wild poppies.

Beginning the month thinking about *all* saints, we end on 30 November with St Andrew's Day. Obviously, a big moment for all Scots, it's also a good day to end the month for all Christians. Andrew, one of those called by Jesus to help lead other followers, doesn't get much coverage in the New Testament compared to his brother Simon Peter. However, he is very significant because he introduced Simon to Jesus. An important part of the life of every living saint (that includes you and me if Jesus is our Saviour and Lord) is introducing another person to Jesus. With Christmas approaching, is there someone you could be praying for to invite to one of the Christmas services in our churches this year?

## Letter from Terence Lenton

Many years ago, I knew a lovely worship song. Unfortunately, these days I can only remember the first line which goes: *Time rolls ever gently onwards*. But those few words mean so much because time does sometimes seem to pass us by without us even noticing.

So, another year is gently rolling onwards towards its end and Christians, once again, come to the last month of the church year. A good time perhaps to think about events that have happened during the past difficult two years and, maybe, to reflect on the effect they have had on many people. I think November is ideal for that because it is traditionally a month of remembrance of past events which have influenced present day society.

The most important event in November is, of course, Remembrance Sunday, a national Remembrance Day when our nation comes together, in unity, to remember the sacrifices made by many people in two world wars and many smaller ones that have ensued. A day when we remember loved ones who have given their lives in the cause of peace and the common good. Lives sacrificed in order to make the world a safer place for us to live in. A sobering thought when we look at the state of the world today.

Another act of remembrance in November is *Bonfire Night* when we remember the plan of Guy Fawkes to blow up parliament in 1605. Had that plan succeeded it could easily have changed the course of our national history.

I suspect that the origin of Bonfire Night is now mostly forgotten but we did sing a serious rhyme which reminded us of its origin:

Remember; remember the fifth of November,  
Gunpowder, treason and plot,  
I see no reason why gunpowder treason  
should ever be forgotten.

Two events from past national life which remind us those past traditions, events and decisions have influenced some aspects of society life today and that those same things today will, without doubt, influence the lives of future generations. Similarly, as it is with the world so it is with the church.

The early church leaders were inspired by the Holy Spirit to establish and direct the path of the church. But the history of the church has been one of continual change, and the intervention, and influence, of individuals has changed churchmanship and worship patterns many times and has brought the church to where it is today with its many diverse forms of Christianity. For instance, we Anglicans are here mainly because of the Reformation and the desire of Henry the Eighth for a divorce, which led to unrest over the whole course of the Tudor dynasty and the many schisms in the church that have followed on. Yet the faith remains firmly built on Jesus Christ and we can still say 'One church, one faith one Lord'. That is our hope for the future!



During the pandemic the leaders of our two churches have been in a difficult position keeping the churches going and ministering to us all and so, our thanks go to those who have led us through this difficult time.

Nevertheless, as we look to the future, I think, we face new challenges as we seek to rebuild, renew and re-energise our churches. That may pose some difficulties because, without doubt, there are many differing views of 'where we are as a church now, where do we go in the future and what should our churchmanship be like' all of which have value. But such a situation is nothing new it has happened throughout the history of the church and, can actually be a healthy as long as we all value each other's viewpoints, listen to each other and remain strong and unified in faith.

So, our vision should be wide, and I think we should always take a little time to reflect on past events and traditions and learn from the experiences of those who have gone before. I believe the success of the intergenerational church will be measured by the ability of us all, as the body of Christ, to welcome new aspiring Christians, nurture our young people and families and try to accommodate the spiritual needs of those church members who find change so difficult.

So, as we approach a new church year and await the arrival of a new incumbent, let us pray for our service leaders and the members of our PCC's that they may be inspired and guided by the Holy Spirit as they take decisions on our behalf and, for us all, that we may be strong and unified as the Body of Christ. One church one faith one Lord.



## St Nicolas Church Finance Update October 2021



Here is an update on our Church Finances.

We have two main streams of income, voluntary giving, and letting out the Church Hall. Our expenditure is very similar from year to year, generally in pace with inflation, most costs being of a fixed nature such as heat and light, staff wages, parish share.

The Coronavirus pandemic had a major effect on church finances in 2020 and continues to do so in 2021. In 2020 during Lockdown, income from Church Hall Bookings was drastically reduced and this situation has continued into 2021. We are now increasing our hall bookings gradually and we expect it to take up to a year or more to return to our previous level of income.

Our income and expenditure figures for 2021 up to 30 September are:

You can see from the figures that we need to boost our income. We shouldn't solely rely on hall bookings to resolve the situation and we are appealing to you to increase your voluntary giving.

We are extremely grateful for the money that you give freely to our church and we are asking you to consider if you can give more.

People now use cash much less than they did and we have people attending services online. It is important that you can give in the way that suits you best and here is the range of ways available:

- Parish Giving Scheme – C of E Regular giving scheme
- Direct payment - into the Church bank account
- Cash or cheque - plate at the back of church
- Debit or Credit card - Contactless Giving in church
- Donate button - on St Nicolas web site

We have our St Nicolas Patronal Festival coming up on Sunday 5 December. This is when we ask you to make a special donation towards the work of the church; this year especially your donations are very much needed.
