Next month Revd Chris Routledge will become the new Vicar of St Nicolas and Priest-in-Charge of St James. It seems like more than 16 months since we said farewell to Kelly, and we're all looking forward to welcoming Chris and Helen and family to our churches.

When the prophet Elijah's mantle passed to his successor Elisha in 2 Kings chapter 2, there was no vacancy period at all. Elisha began working before Elijah finished. One day Elisha was warned that Elijah would soon be taken up to heaven and then it would be over to him, and when he sensed the day was coming soon, he followed Elijah, not letting him out of his sight. Seeing him following him around, Elijah asked him what he could do for him before he was taken. Elisha responded, 'Let me inherit a double portion of your spirit.'

In the Church of England, the mantle is never passed directly from one incumbent to the next. Instead, it is worn by many people called to fulfil essential leadership aspects until the new incumbent arrives. Chris takes up the mantle on 8 September, and it would be tempting for all who have carried extra responsibility to say 'over to you now'! May I suggest that we follow Elijah's example and say to Chris as we hand over the mantle to him,

'What can I do for you?' He may not answer as Elisha did, but there may be ways in which we can help smooth the transition from Kelly (through those who have carried the mantle during the vacancy) to Chris, that ensures the continuing evolution of the mission and ministry of both parishes.

Elisha's prophetic ministry was different to Elijah's but there were similarities too. The arrival of a new incumbent doesn't either mark the return to business as usual or a completely new start for our churches but rather a new phase that builds on the past and takes us into the future. The shape of this phase will become more apparent as we seek to listen to God together under the leadership of Chris. That may take a while to accomplish, and we will do well not to run ahead of the Lord.

So, let's be patient, prayerful, and supportive and seek a double portion of God's Spirit for not only Chris, but all of us so that God's kingdom work in our two parishes may progress in the way God wants for this new phase. And let's be aware about our own expectations about the future and bring those under the lordship of Jesus, giving space for the possibility that the future may be different to the past, or different from what we imagined it might be.

With every blessing as we prepare for this exciting new stage for our two parishes, Adrian
