

Remembrance-tide: a season for thankfulness

When we see the awful scenes of destruction, suffering and anguish from war torn countries around the world, although deeply disturbing, they also make me realize the enormous number of things that we can easily take for granted about life in the UK. Let's respond to these news images by praying for these situations, but also in gratitude for all that we enjoy: peace, health, beauty, education, homes, political stability, family life, religious freedom. When we see countries bereft of these, we realize again how much we have to thank God for.

The Christian speaker J John tells the story of a man in Budapest who goes to the rabbi to complain: "Life is unbearable. There are nine of us living in one room. What can I do?" The rabbi answers, "Take your goat into the room with you." The man is incredulous, but the rabbi insists. "Do as I say and come back in a week." A week later the man comes back looking more distraught than before. "We cannot stand it," he tells the rabbi. "The goat is filthy." The rabbi then tells him, "Go home and let the goat out. And come back in a week." Radiant, the man returns exclaiming, "Life is beautiful. We enjoy every minute of it now there's no goat – only the nine of us."

An attitude of gratitude is an important ingredient of prayer. The prayer structure based on the word 'ACTS' (adoration, confession, thanksgiving, supplication) includes two sections for gratitude. Remembering and giving thanks for God's past goodness builds up our faith and gives us confidence to request God's help in the future.

In the Bible, we read the Apostle Paul's advice to those living in 1st Century Philippi and his emphasis on gratitude too: 'Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God.' (Philippians chapter 4 verse 6).

November is the season for remembering and giving thanks. Giving thanks for a loved one can help relieve some to the pain of bereavement and sadness of loss. At the Family Memorial Service at St James Church on 30 October we remembered loved ones, and gave thanks to God for them too.

On 13 November, we will come together for Remembrance Sunday to honour the service and ultimate sacrifice of servicemen and women, and to thank God for the national peace and security we enjoy as a result of their sacrifice. "At the going down of the sun, we will remember them." We remember the fallen with gratitude as well as sadness.

In this remembrance season, what are you grateful to God for?

On 20th November our churches will be marking Safeguarding Sunday 2022.

This is an annual awareness raising campaign, coordinated by *Thirtyone:eight*, an Independent Christian Safeguarding charity, to help churches across the UK to share what they are doing to make their places of worship safer for everyone. The theme this year is 'One church, one day, one message'.

As part of the event, we will be exploring how safeguarding is a demonstration of our Christian faith, we'll talk about the safeguarding arrangements our church has in place, and we'll be thanking the people involved in making this happen. This will be done in an all-age appropriate way using the resources produced by *Thirtyone:eight*.

Safeguarding Sunday is one part of our ongoing commitment to making our church safer.

Speak up

The silence around issues of abuse can be deafening, often leaving those that have been abused to be the sole voices speaking out. We will use our voice and our influence to publicly and privately speak up about the injustice of abuse and the need for change.

Put survivors first

Too often we see cases where victims and survivors have not been believed, have been silenced or have been further abused by the response they have received. We will listen to victims and survivors and ensure we put their needs at the heart of any response.

Conceal nothing

When abuse is discovered it is important that it is fully brought into the light so that justice can be served and those that have been affected can receive the help they need. We will not cover up or collude but be open, transparent, and truly reportant about what has becomed.

Take responsibility

Rather than apportion blame or point the finger at others, we must acknowledge that abuse happens in any culture that allows or creates the circumstances for it to occur. We will take responsibility for the ways we have personally and corporately failed and will take the necessary steps to shoulder that responsibility and the reparations that must come as a result.

Make change happen

Apologies and learning lessons are important steps in the process of responding to abuse, but too often that is where we stop. We will not just take responsibility, and learn lessons, but will make active, tangible, timely steps towards change and encourage others to do the same.

Hold each other accountable

It's important to acknowledge that issues of abuse are not confined to one particular denomination or tradition, but are issues experienced across all expressions of the Church. We will commit to holding ourselves mutually accountable by accepting the challenge of others about our own practice and challenging poor practice wherever we see it.

Operation Christmas Child (OCC)

Once again, this year we will be supporting OCC.

A simple heartfelt gift, packed with love and fuelled by prayer can mean so much to a child in need.


Will you pack a shoebox again, or even for the first time, to share God's love with even more boys and girls this season?

Prayers with poppies - suitable for children

Anyone can be involved in prayers for remembering, whether in church or at home. All you need for this simple prayer is a poppy each.

Look at your poppy. Poppies are bright and cheerful flowers: give thanks to God for the lives of those who have died in war, remembering all the joy they brought to families and friends, and all the good things they did for their home and their country.

Then look at the red petals: red reminds us of danger and harm. Ask God to be close to those who are still facing danger each day, to give courage to the armed forces, and compassion to all who help others.

Place your whole hand over the poppy: poppies are also fragile and need to be handled gently. God cares for those who are hurting and those who are sad. Ask God to comfort all who are grieving the loss of someone they love.

Finally place a finger on the centre of the poppy: ask God to help you play your part in working for peace in the world.




